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#### A MESSAGE FROM THE DETACHMENT COMMANDER

I am please to provide the interim report to the Police Service Board. You will notice this report is not as fulsome as others. As we transition to one detachment, one board we compile our data and information quarterly and as such you are receiving an interim report. The next reporting cycle will return to the more fulsome report.

This interim report does allow for an update on our summer planning. The Grey Bruce detachment area is a vacation destination for many, particularly in the summer. Your Grey Bruce OPP has developed a comprehensive plan using analytics, officer input and historical data to determine the times and locations that officers are required. Using statistical information as our guide officers will be tactically and intentionally assigned where they can have the greatest effect. Additionally, the Grey Bruce OPP has implemented a different strategy for marine patrol that should maximize our presence on our waterways.

The OPP has introduced a new tool for deployments called MET (Major Events Tool). This program is specifically designed to track major events. Officers from across the province can sign up using the MET system, indicating their availability, personal information and special skills. The majority of shifts in Grey Bruce have been filled using this program. It is important to note that municipalities will see an increased presence; however, the billing does not change and continues to be a four-year average of calls for service.

We are looking forward to a summer season of safety on our highways, trails and waterways.

#### TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT UNIT

In the first five (5) months of 2023 (Jan-May), the Traffic Management Unit (TMU), consisting of two (2) Provincial Constables, have issued *over 500 provincial offence charges, nearly 500 warnings*, and have laid additional criminal charges as it relates to impaired driving. TMU have additionally facilitated and participated in Commercial Motor Vehicle (CMV) enforcement projects alongside the frontline and the West Region Traffic Incident Management Enforcement (TIME) Team and the MTO with much success.

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#### DETACHMENT COMMANDER'S REPORT



#### Grey-Bruce OPP Detachment Commander

I am pleased to introduce the Q2 (Quarter two) Police Service Report. Our communities are in full summer mode and the traffic in the area is an indication that our area remains a popular destination for travelers. The Q2 report covers both the Township of Chatsworth and all of Grey Bruce and reflects the future of one detachment, one board.

The OPP has introduced an electronic tool to manage large deployments across the province and the Grey Bruce detachment is benefiting from the tool. The Grey Bruce detachment will post available Grey Bruce shifts on a centrally available web page, which allows officers from across the province the opportunity to support Grey Bruce during the busy summer months. The new process has realized several new officers to the county. Who knows, maybe some of them will enjoy it so much they may return full time!

The impaired operation charges across the detachment area remain a concern. Our officers are diligently conducting RIDE throughout the area and the impaired charges area result of their hard work. The OPP continues to educate the public on the perils of impaired operation and the other significant detractors to road safety.

Two Grey Bruce members were recently recognized by Grey Highland for their contributions to public safety. Staff Sergeant Anderson and Provincial Constable O'Neill were awarded the "Police Officer of the Year". It was a special day when these two deserving officers were recognized by the Police Service Board and communities they serve.

Although a definitive date has not been identified the implementation of one detachment, one board is anticipated therefore the reports will continue to reflect that eventuality. I look forward to the efficiencies and collaboration that the complexion of the new board will foster.

As people travel to and from the Grey Bruce area, I encourage all to respect speed limits, avoid distractions, drive sober and use safety/restraint devices. Stay safe everyone!

#### CRIME

#### CRIME UNIT

Supervisor: Detective Sergeant Byron Schwass

The Grey Bruce County Major Crime Unit (7 Detectives) led, assisted, or supervised 61 Benchmark Occurrences April 1st, to June 30th, 2023. This includes 25 Sudden Death investigations, (3 Opiate overdoses) 13 reported sexual assaults, 3 Indecent Acts, 2 serious armed robberies, 2 robberies without weapons, and 3 large \$ frauds.

#### **Noteworthy cases:**

Within this period, Grey Bruce OPP responded to 2 serious armed robbery occurrences. One was a business on Saugeen First Nation where shots were fired during the robbery, the second being the takeover armed robbery of the Dundalk Credit Union.

The Saugeen First Nation robbery resulted in two Toronto/Waterloo men arrested, one prohibited firearm seized, and drugs suspected to be cocaine and fentanyl.

The Dundalk Credit Union robbery has been linked to several other Credit Union robberies across Southern Ontario. A Grey Bruce DC has been assigned as a member of a multi-jurisdictional investigative team on this unsolved robbery.

A large multi-national fraud investigation is currently underway with this Crime Unit, the OPP Crypto/Cyber Crime Unit, and the FBI regarding a suspect, or suspect group, operating within Grey County. One DC has been assigned and the matter is on going.

A pedestrian/motor vehicle fatality was deemed a criminal act versus a traffic incident and the OPP Criminal Investigation Bureau (CIB) engaged, case managing numerous area Detectives. A lengthy detailed investigation led to recent charges of Dangerous Driving Causing Death being laid.

One DC has been the primary investigator on an opiate death from 2021 where 2 Toronto suspects have been identified as the traffickers of fentanyl and arrests are pending.

This Unit is also assisting other Major Crime Units with investigations/statements and providing guidance to uniform personnel on criminal investigations. One DC is currently assigned on a homicide in Wellington County.

\*\*\*

The Grey Bruce Major Crime Unit continues to follow up leads, prepare for court, and investigate several ongoing Homicides which fall under the direction of OPP Criminal Investigations Branch (CIB). The SPRUNG Homicide (Meaford) completed the preliminary inquiry for 1<sup>st</sup> degree Murder and is now proceeding to trial. The SOLOMON Homicide (Saugeen First Nation) trial pending. The JACKSON attempt murder (North Bruce Peninsula) is still under active investigation, and the HIBMA Manslaughter (Sauble Beach) is also proceeding to trial.

#### COMMUNITY STREET CRIME UNIT | CSCU

Supervisor: Detective Sergeant Jamie Blair

The Community Street Crime Unit (CSCU) Grey Bruce (5 Detectives & 2 vacancies) currently has 30 active drug or property crime investigations ongoing in various stages.

Detective Sergeant Jamie BLAIR returned from his assignment and is back running the unit.

One Detective Constable is off until August, leaving us with two members in Grey-Bruce.

Members of CSCU are still following up on a number of investigations that resulted in the recovery of stolen property. Officers are currently linking occurrences and clearing these up.

CSCU has four parallel drug trafficking investigations linked to Opioid overdoses in the area underway. Officers are obtaining judicial authorization to search cell phones and other electronic devices seized from the scene. In two investigation the Cellphone download has been completed and the information is currently being reviewed for useful evidence.

In response to the number of Opioid related occurrences officers are actively undertaking a number of proactive drug investigations in the area.

Grey Bruce CSCU continues to prioritize local crime trends, the opioid crises and targeting local people identified in property thefts. CSCU members are committed to continuous learning and are attending training when time permits. CSCU has developed local training initiatives for front line members to promote officer safety and enhance their local knowledge on the current drug and property crimes trends in the area.

#### **COMMUNITY RESPONSE**

#### MOBILE CRISIS RESPONSE TEAM | MCRT

**Provincial Constable Ang Hastings** 

The Mobile Crisis Response Team has been busy in Grey Bruce attending live calls with frontline officers, conducting followups and making community referrals.

As the programs grows and fulfills the needs of the community the need for additional clinicians has been identified and another clicinian, a registered nurse, with decades of experience in the correctional community has been hired to join the Grey-Bruce MCRT team. While this novel program establishes itself in the community it continutes to grow and evolve to meet the needs of our community members and better connect those in crisis with immediate assistance and to address the outstanding needs of the at risk members facing mental health and addiction related crisises and ongoing issues.

While only 40% of mental health calls for service occur during MCRT working hours, over 90% of all mental health related calls are actioned by MCRT at the time of or after the fact. When a clinician is present for a mental health apprehension the likelihood of hospital admission increases by 10% on average. Since the implementation of the MCRT program the reduction in officers hours spent at hospital has been substantial, and those in need are more quickly and directly connected to the community resources they need.

#### **MEDIA**

#### Provincial Constable Krista Linthorne

In late June 2023 the Grey-Bruce OPP welcomed a new Community Services and Media Relations Officer, Provincial Constable Krista Linthorne. She grew up in the Grey-Bruce area and has been employed with the Ontario Provincial Police for 8.5 years. You can connect with PC Linthorne at the Wiarton OPP detachment or through media releases and her social media posts across Grey-Bruce at police functions and community events alike.

The Grey-Bruce OPP wishes PC Nick Wilson well in his new role with the Traffic Incident Management and Enforcement Team with the West Region OPP Highway Safety Division. As Nick passes the reigns to Krista he will be busy keeping the roadways, waterways and trails of southwestern Ontario safe in his new traffic oriented role after completing his tenure serving Grey-Bruce as the Community Safety, School Resource and Media Relations Officer.

PC Linthorne will be showcasing how the Grey Bruce OPP contributes to crime prevention, law enforcement, assisting victims of crime and community engagement.

One notable social media post which gained a lot of media attention was on June 26<sup>th</sup> a Lamborghini was stopped for stunt driving. This post had over 4000 comments on Facebook. The Grey Bruce OPP is committed to road safety.

Grey-Bruce Crime Stoppers – 203 new tips have been received during the second quarter of 2023, which is ahead of the second quarter of 2022 by 73 tips. Grey Bruce OPP tips: 86 (39%).

In the second quarter of 2023 Georgian Bluffs, the Brockton PSB, Arran-Elderslie, Meaford, and the Owen Sound PSB donated to our program, and we are very grateful for their support. We continue to reach out to each of the Police Services Boards and Municipalities of Grey and Bruce to request funding commitments for our program.

An Auxiliary member prepared a Manual on OPP Drill Procedures for the Program Office to be used at Auxiliary Recruit classes. As well the same member prepared a presentation on Marine procedures to assist the Unit members when they assist OPP Boat Operators on marine patrols that was presented at one of the meetings in Wiarton. The member responsible for setting up and moving the Speed Spy program plus updating the Speeding Charges sign had one set up/change this month. A member also provided airport transfer for a Regular member that had been on a deployment. An OPP recruiting session presentation was held at Sauble with two Auxiliary members attending to assist the Staff. A member attended Western Region Head Quarters in London for a weekend to take the 2 day Safeguard training course. Plans are being put in place this month for Food Drives to take place during July and August as a result of the successful one conducted last year.

June had an interview conducted about an Auxiliary member who is in the process to join the regular force. Two Safeguard trained members assisted another Auxiliary member to do a Safeguard evaluation in Orangeville. The member responsible for setting up and moving the Speed Spy program plus updating the Speeding Charges sign had two set up/changes this month. A member also provided airport transfer for a Regular member that was attending training out of province. A bike patrol was done in Sauble Beach and a Bike Rodeo was held at Saugeen FN. An Auxiliary member assisted on Marine Patrols as well to move equipment from another detachment to Meaford detachment. Food Drives have been scheduled for July and August in several locations. Patrols with Regular officers were conducted in a number of Zones this month.

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#### TRAFFIC MANAGEMENT UNIT | TMU

During the second quarter (Q2) of 2023 the Grey-Bruce Traffic Management Unit (TMU), consisting of two Provincial Constables, had a combined total of 315 traffic occurrences resulting in 322 total charges. 243 offence notices issued and 79 court summons were issued. Additionally, over 256 warnings were issued by the TMU during the second quarter of 2023.

The Grey Bruce OPP Traffic Management Unit second-quarter results highlights their ongoing commitment to ensuring road safety and enforcing traffic laws in the region. The unit's diligent efforts have resulted in a significant number of charges and warnings issued, as well as successful collaborations with community partners.

During the second quarter, the Grey Bruce OPP Traffic Management Unit issued a total of 322 provincial offence charges, demonstrating their dedication to upholding traffic regulations and promoting safe driving habits within the community. These charges reflect their proactive approach in addressing traffic violations and ensuring the well-being of all road users.

In addition to the charges issued, the unit provided 256 warnings to motorists, serving as a reminder to adhere to traffic laws and encouraging safer driving practices. Warnings are an essential part of the unit's efforts to educate and raise awareness among the public, fostering a culture of responsible driving and reducing the risk of accidents.

The Grey Bruce OPP Traffic Management Unit's commitment to combating impaired driving remains unwavering. During the second quarter, they successfully laid four impaired driving charges, emphasizing their determination to remove impaired drivers from the road and protect the community from potential harm. These charges serve as a reminder that driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs will not be tolerated, and enforcement measures will be taken to ensure public safety.

One of the highlights of the second quarter was the Grey Bruce Traffic Unit's collaboration with community partners, including the Saugeen Shores Police Service, Hanover Police Service, West Grey Police Service, Owen Sound Police Service, and the Ministry of Transportation. Together, they organized and executed a four-day joint force commercial motor vehicle blitz. This operation aimed to enhance commercial vehicle safety, inspect compliance with transportation regulations, and ensure the safe transportation of goods throughout the region. The successful partnership between law enforcement agencies and the Ministry of Transportation highlights the unit's commitment to working collaboratively to promote road safety. The four-day blitz resulted in 117 commercial motor vehicles being inspected, 72 charges laid, 60 warnings issued, and 66 commercial motor vehicles being placed out of service for a variety of different safety violations.

The Grey Bruce OPP Traffic Management Unit's achievements in the second quarter exemplify their ongoing efforts to ensure safer roadways for all residents and visitors. Through their enforcement initiatives, education campaigns, and collaborative partnerships, they are actively working towards creating a community where road safety is a top priority.

# Please don't pay the con artist

## Over \$72,000 lost year to date in Southern Bruce County

This is Fraud Prevention month, and the South Bruce Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is asking residents to continue watching out for cons and scams after more than \$72,000 has been sent to scammers, year-to-date, by residents of Southern Bruce County.

Cons and scams are attempted daily through online platforms, by phone, by letter mail, or by fax. The reality is that fraud is a multi-million-dollar enterprise that will only end when the con artists stop making money.

Year to date; Twenty-four fraud reports have been received by the South Bruce OPP. Seven of these scam attempts resulted in total dollar losses of \$72,950. All of these "successful" scams were for the purchase of goods arranged online.

Although scammers will change tactics and come up with new schemes, here are some of the common "tools" in a con artists toolbox:

- Spoofing. Appears to be contact from a friend, legitimate company or even a branch of the government, but it's not. They can manipulate caller-ID to display a number they want. To avoid the scam; end the call and connect with the real person, company, branch of the government. If it's an email, hover over "reply" and see what email address shows up.
- Urgency. "Act now", "limited time offer", "click now". The scammer doesn't want you to consider the offer as suspi-

cious. To avoid the scam; time is on your side. Verify the contact BEFORE you go any further.

- Emotional manipulation. Con artists will play on your emotions to get your money. Romance scam, emergency scam, grandparent scam, charity scam. To avoid the scam; be suspicious when they play on your emotions. Check out the Anti-Fraud Centre's A-Z index of scams, maybe this is a listed scam.
- Pop-ups. Boxes that appear on your computer or device screen. "You've won a prize", "your device is infected", etc. A toll-free number is provided for you to call. To avoid the scam; install anti-virus, pop-up blockers, clear your cache, block cookies - when possible. Don't use public Wi-Fi - particularly for online banking. Never call the number in a pop-up.

The South Bruce OPP is offering you some tips to help protect you from a con artist:

- If it sounds too good to be true, it likely is.
- Remember that you can't win a contest that you didn't enter in the first place.
- If you have a concern about your computer, take it to a reputable repair shop for service. Do not provide remote access to a "tech" that calls you out of the blue
- Gift cards are a red flag. If someone contacts you and directs you to buy gift cards, you need to hang up the phone.
- · Your best defence is to verify any unsolicited contact. Unsolicited means that you didn't ask for it.



Police and prosecutors work together from the beginning at the Serious Fraud Office.

More than 500 investors from across Canada lost about \$40 million altogether between 2013 and 2017 in a Ponzi scheme orchestrated by a Barrie, Ont., man involving point-of-sale terminals that never existed.

When Charles DeBono claimed he sold the company, Debit Direct, and took off to the Dominican Republic with investors' money, reports flooded at least nine different police services.

"Initially, it was very unorganized," said Peter Hammond,



one of DeBono's victims, who lost \$55,000. "Depending on who you were, and where you were calling from, they'd direct you to one police department or another."

But then, a newly formed initiative that brought police and prosecutors in Ontario together to try and tackle major fraud took on the case and centralized the

investigation. *Project Debit Direct* was one of the first cases the province's Serious Fraud Office (SFO) worked on after forming five years ago.

Last June, after a four-year investigation and prosecution, DeBono was sentenced to seven years in prison, which was cut down to just over four years after he received credit for pre-sentence custody. DeBono was also ordered to pay nearly \$29 million in restitution to victims.

The case exemplifies both the benefits of dedicated fraud resources and specialists working together — and the limitations even those efforts face when it comes to victims recoup-

ing their losses.

"We're going in after the fact where we're fighting uphill," said Det. Supt. Dominic Chong, director of the Serious Fraud Office for the Ontario Provincial Police (OPP).

"We have restrained or seized about \$2.4 million in Canadian funds and about \$4 million US in the Dominican—that's a drop in the bucket."

#### Trying to set precedents

Since its inception in 2018, Ontario's SFO's investigation branch has taken on 12 cases, Chong said, which are generally lengthy and take years. So far, investigators have laid charges in four of those cases. Two are still before the courts, and the other two, which includes the Debit Direct case, ended in convictions.

"I look at the SFO as a centre of excellence for fraud investigation and fraud prevention," said Chong.

"If there is something out there that no other police or law enforcement agencies have tackled before, and if we can successfully address that issue — that kind of sets the benchmark for other agencies and other police services to follow."

Chong credits the SFO's ability to take on those kinds of cases to resources that allow it to overcome some challenges facing other fraud investigators. Unlike other units, the office is self-sufficient when it comes to otherwise shared resources such as digital forensics, includes full-time investigators from both the OPP and several Greater Toronto Area police services and works with dedicated Crown attorneys from the get-go.

"Fraud investigations are very complicated," he said. "It would be very challenging to have a Crown attorney assigned at the end of the investigation and be able to catch up enough to understand a case and be able to effectively prosecute the case."

#### Fraud prosecutors could help address dropped charges

Extending fraud specialization from police to prosecutors is one way to address the roughly half of fraud charges Crown lawyers end up dropping in Ontario, according to the president of the International Centre for Criminal Law Reform.

"You could reduce that substantially if you knew that the prosecutors that are dealing with these cases are specialists in this area, and that they are dealing with judges who also are specialists in this area," said Peter German, a lawyer and former deputy commissioner of the RCMP.

"I think it will reduce a lot of the disclosure problems."

CBC Toronto requested an interview with the SFO's chief

Crown counsel to learn more about how the prosecution side
operates, but Ontario's Ministry of the Attorney General declined the request.

German argues Canada needs a national strategy for financial crime.

"Federal, provincial, municipal governments have to sit

down at the table and say, 'this is a significant issue,'" said German. "It's not just for the politicians, it's also for those that work within policing systems, prosecutorial systems, and the courts to advocate what they feel can best deal with this problem."

Last year's federal budget provided \$2 million to Public Safety Canada to begin the initial work of developing and designing a Canada Financial Crimes Agency, which would become the national

enforcement body for investigating complex financial crimes. But at this point the scope of jurisdiction for the proposed agency and how that would affect police services across the country remains unclear.

#### 'Fraud impacts everyone'

Outside of bolstering and fixing enforcement systems, many of the fraud experts CBC Toronto spoke to put just as much or more emphasis on changing the way society thinks about victims.

"We need to create this critical mass in terms of understanding fraud impacts everyone," said Chong.

The OPP — and by proxy, Chong — oversee both the investigations branch and adjunct services for the SFO. The office's adjunct services include crime prevention, public education, training and victim services.

"What we realized when the SFO was established was that the victims of fraud really were not receiving the appropriate support that they need through no fault of anybody, just limited resources," said Chong. "Fraud is often forgotten."

SFO's victim services liaise with the victims in their cases



throughout the process, from investigation through prosecution and beyond.

Aline Vlasceanu would like to see that kind of support expanded so fraud victims have access to the same services as other victims of crime.

"The psychological impact, the social impact, the financial impact, the emotional toll that it takes on victims is just as big as if it were a violent crime," said Vlasceanu, executive director of Canadian Resource Centre for Victims of Crime.

Given the limited police resources, Chong sees public education as the strongest tool to fight fraud — whether that be warning bulletins about prominent frauds from the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre, or the SFO flagging scams to affected industry groups or communities being targeted.

"What we need to do is turn off the supply of victims, and limit the number of people that can be victimized by fraudsters."





With all demographic groups being expected to use technology for many facets of their lives, Canadians are being increasingly targeted by cyber criminals.

Being able to recognize these techniques will go a long way in helping to combat cyber crimes. In the past decade, technology has completely transformed the fraud landscape, which is more widespread and sophisticated than ever before. With the public's help the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre wants to deliver information, tips and strategies for Ontarians to fight back.

In 2022, the CAFC received fraud reports totalling a staggering \$530 million in victim losses. This was nearly a 40 per cent increase from the 2021, unprecedented \$380 million in losses. In 2021, approximately 75 per cent of all reports the CAFC received were cyber enabled, and this is expected to increased year-over-year. It is estimated that only 5-10 per cent of victims report scams and frauds to the CAFC or law enforcement.

According to the CAFC, in 2022, the top frauds affecting Canadians on a daily basis were:

- Investment frauds represented \$308 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$136 million.
- Romance frauds represented \$59 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$20 million.
- Spear phishing frauds (Business Email Compromise) represented \$58 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$21.1 million.
- Service scams represented \$20.5 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$8.1 million.

• Extortion frauds represented \$19 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$4.8 million.

#### How fraudsters use technology

Fraudsters will create spoofed websites, will use spoofed telephone numbers using Voice over internet protocol (VoIP) to mimic legitimate numbers, will have victims download remote entry software providing access to devices and computers or send out phishing texts pretending to be businesses or governments offering refunds.

Dominic Chong, Detective Superintendent, Director of Anti-Rackets Branch & Serious Fraud Office of the Ontario Provincial Police, points out that citizens must be vigilant watching out for predators ever seeking to take advantage of the nieve or vulnerable.

"Fraud continues to devastate lives in Ontario and across this country," Chong says. "One of the best ways to combat fraudsters is to be armed with knowledge, information and awareness. I encourage everyone to learn the information and tips being made available to protect yourself, and to share these with your loved ones to help protect them. Together we can fight back and lessen the impact of fraud on our communities."

"Every year millions of dollars are defrauded from the citizens of Ontario utilizing various means and schemes. Together we can spot fraud and help to prevent our loved ones and friends from becoming victims," Chong concluded.







#### Local Opioid deaths increasing

Seven lives have been lost in seven days due to opioids, four of those in Simcoe County region.

The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) is issuing a dire warning of the possibility of a highly potent and po-

tentially fatal strain of illicit opioids circulating in central Ontario.

Police say four of the suspected overdoses in the past week were in Huronia West, Orillia, Southern Georgian Bay, and Huntsville.

The ages and genders of the victims was not re-

leased "as the investigations are continuing," OPP stated.

OPP cautions the public that fentanyl is an extremely potent synthetic opioid, up to 100 times more potent than morphine and up to 40 to 50 times more potent than heroin.

Another drug currently on the streets, carfentanil, is a synthetic opioid up to 100 times more potent than fentanyl.

The prevalence of illicit opioids distributed through drug trafficking networks continues to increase, police say.

Fentanyl can be lethal in very small quantities. However, if someone's drug of choice is mixed with or contains fentanyl, it can potentially kill them, experts say.



Opioid users have a higher risk of experiencing an overdose due to fentanyl potency, especially when the fentanyl is illicit and not sourced from a pharmaceutical company, OPP states.

Police warn users that it's impossible for a user to determine the quantity of fentanyl they may be using because you can't see, smell or taste it.

Symptoms of fentanyl/opioid exposure can include:

- Difficulty walking, talking or staying awake
- Blue lips or nails
- Very small pupils
- Cold and clammy skin
- · Dizziness and confusion
- Extreme drowsiness
- Choking, gurgling or snoring sounds
- Inability to wake up, even when shaken
- Slow, weak or not breathing

Residents at risk of experiencing an overdose are encouraged to have naloxone kits, which are available free of charge at the health unit. Naloxone can temporarily reverse the effects of opioids.

The Good Samaritan Drug Overdose Act (GSDOA) provides legal protection for individuals seeking emergency help during an overdose.

The GSDOA protects the person who seeks help, whether they stay or leave the overdose scene before help arrives, the person experiencing the overdose, and anyone else at the scene when help arrives.



# Thieves using AirTags to identify, steal high end cars, Ontario police warn

Ontario police are warning vehicle owners about thieves they say are using Apple tracking devices to identify expensive cars, track them to their home address and then steal them.

Over a 24-hour period, Ontario Provincial Police said officers from its Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry detachment were told about two instances where Apple AirTags were found on vehicles.

Police said one of the owners, notified of the devices by their iPhone, found it in the fuse box under the hood

The thieves placed the AirTags under the vehicles while they are parked in a public space so they could later track them to the owner's homes and steal them from the driveway, police suggested.

Vehicle owners are being warned to look for AirTags on or under their cars.

"An iPhone user will receive a notification that an Air-Tag is nearby. If you own an Android phone, you can download an app called Tracker Detect, which will provide the same alert," OPP said.

Conversely, adding an AirTag to your car yourself can help to locate it if it is stolen. "You as the owner can respond using the same tools," an OPP media release said.

"Equipping your vehicle with your own AirTag could assist police in locating your vehicle if it was ever stolen."

# Man Cleared for Giving Children Chocolates

(National Post)

A "suspicious older male" under investigation for handing out chocolates in the Ontario town of Hanover turned out to simply be doing random acts of kindness, police say.

On Friday, a news release from the police department in the town of 7,600 people said officers were on the lookout for a "suspicious older male" with grey hair and grey facial hair, who may have had prescription sunglasses on.

The man, the release said, had pulled over his vehicle last Wednesday afternoon, approached a youth and offered him a box of Pot of Gold chocolates. The boy, the release noted, refused the chocolates, but the man insisted and said he was to take them home to his mom instead.

The police sprang into action, issuing a news release and noting a second suspicious incident from last Thursday in which a man had been seen taking photos of children playing in a backyard. As it turned out, the two incidents weren't linked.

"The person who handed out the 'Pot of Gold' chocolates has been identified and interviewed," wrote Police Chief Christopher Knoll on Twitter. "They handed out chocolates to several people of varying ages inspired by random act of kindness. Police determined the motives were pure and genuine. Thank you to everyone for helping us."

Police in Hanover, which is located about 180 kilometres from Toronto, are still looking for the second man who's alleged to have taken photos of kids.

#### Look out for crooks with gleaming smiles

On March 5, 2023, Wellington County Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) responded to a report of a freight theft on Highway 7 in Guelph/Eramosa Township.

It was reported that a white Volvo semi-truck and a white 53' trailer (Ontario #V2698F) labeled with decal #53101R on it, had been stolen from a storage lot.


The trailer was reported to contain approximately \$250 000 worth of toothpaste.

# 64 Mexicans rescued from Ontario human trafficking ring

York Regional Police say 64 Mexican-born nationals have been rescued from an international labour trafficking ring that was operating in Ontario and several people have been charged.

Deputy police chief Alvaro Almeida told reporters on Friday that the information learned through Project Norte was "just as disturbing as it is compelling." "Sixty-four of them were subject to deplorable living conditions with no way out," Almeida said. "Our members were shocked at the conditions they were living in."

"If anyone suspects a farm, factory, warehouse or any other business mistreating foreign workers please report it to the police or Crime Stoppers."

# \$20,000 worth of equipment stolen from Guelph historical train

Restoring trains is a labour of love for members of the Guelph Historical Railway Association (GHRA), but it has turned into a little more than they had bargained for after a theft over the weekend of February 11th.

With an estimated \$20,000 of equipment stolen from one of its train cars, the GHRA says the restoration that was expected to be finished this spring will now take another year or two.

The thieves were able to get into the train car from underneath, going through the sheet metal, said Drew Goff, one of the directors at GHRA. They also broke into a caboose car and the thieves defecated in it.

Copper piping from the heating system was stolen, the wiring was cut, and many other items were damaged. After spending about \$3,000 on new control boards, and wires, it was stripped, said Goff.

Empty cans of alcohol and tools presumably left by the thieves were strewn inside and outside the train car, he said. Some of the items stolen are irreplaceable since they are original to the train car. "We've been collecting all the pieces to put back, Goff said. "You can't buy these light fixtures. You can't buy the door fixture. We're trying to collect them and bring it back to its 1960s appearance and of course it's metal and they want metal to scrap."

"The initial intention was when you walk into this car you're walking back into 1960 as it was," said Steve Host, GHRA president.

The train car was acquired in 2020 from the Waterloo Central Railway. "To us it's a citizen's asset for the city. And the railway is part of our fabric as part of our community," said Host.

"It's becoming a money pit, obviously," said Eric Repaci, founding member of GHRA. The ultimate plan is to have the train run and collect fares to help with the cost of operations. Unlike many museums the GHT is actually a live rail and the railway does move our equip-



ment. "It would have given people the opportunity to experience a train ride in that era," said Repaci.

The GHRA will be fundraising in the future to raise money for the restoration and the association has reached out to the VIA Historical Association in Toronto, and have been offered components and parts.

Theves came well prepared with grinding discs, Sawzalls, pipe cutters, all manners of tools and in the course of a night gutted the coach. Also taken are over 20 metres of steam heat shielding and steam heat piping, window frames and curtains as well as "CC&F" specific interior trimmings and finishing's and at least three coach seat frames.

Air conditioning piping, plumbing between the "A" end bathrooms, overhead panels as well as tools including a \$1500 Huck rivet gun.

They cut the brake pipe in three places, including what seems like an attempt to take the air reservoir underneath the coach. The hot water boiler that provided heat via the steam heating pipes was completely destroyed.

"We firmly believe that if we can get the funds to repair this coach we can have in a state to show off our progress in its restoration come spring, and be well on our way to having it completely restored to its 1960s appearance," said Repaci. "This passenger car to us is more than just a passenger car, it's a community asset and we plan to use it as such once it's complete."


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

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
# **Crime Stoppers Golf Tournament a huge success**

# A rising crime that affects everyone

Crime Stoppers of Grey Bruce and the South Bruce OPP are asking for the public's assistance in solving the theft of copper.

Sometime between August 18 at 2:00 p.m. and August 22, 2016 at 7:00 a.m. a Hydro One site located in the 700 Block of the Huron-Kinloss Town Line was forcibly entered and a quantity of copper wire was taken. The value of the stolen wire is estimated to be more than \$200.00.

Other Crime Stopper locations have also reported similar thefts. For the second time in a month, some rural Kingston, Ont., residents were without internet as a thief cut a fibre optic cable to steal copper.

It was another day of lost business for Josh Anderson when his internet service was suddenly interrupted due to an intentionally cut telecommunication cable. "I woke up early this morning, had alerts that the internet was down at our small business and, lo and behold, the fibre was down again," said Anderson.

Kingston Police were called to the area north of Kingston to investigate theft of a section of Bell telecommunications line. The cables, much like catalytic converters, have precious metals in them: copper.

Overnight it appears that someone cut down the Perth Road Cables and made off with the copper, much to the chagrin of people like Anderson.

"For businesses out here, it's crippling. I mean, fibre's a great service until somebody does this," added Anderson.

Kingston city councillor Gary Oosterhof, who represents the affected area, said his first concern was peoples' safety.

"People have certainly seen what's happening and



it's pretty devastating. I can imagine it's not going to be easy to fix, so we certainly hope that this doesn't happen again," he said.

A representative from Bell Canada told Global News in a statement: "In this latest incident, thieves cut down a section of telecommunications fibre cable to steal the copper wire, disrupting service for more than 1,000 customers."

It's a problem that Oosterhof and Anderson said needs a solution. "There are measures that, you know,

could be implemented I think to make it less attractive to be stealing copper," said Oosterhof.

"I feel like more regulation around the recycling and scrap industries. It's the same situation of stealing catalytic converters. It's the same," added Anderson.

Kingston Police said that the matter has been handed over to an investigator, and Bell is urging anyone who sees suspicious activity

around electric lines to call police or Crime Stoppers..



Copper wire thefts have been steadily on the rise across North America, thanks to recent upswings in its selling price. Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Ontario, Saskatchewan and Alberta have all reported recent increases in the frequency of copper wire thefts on businesses, homes and construction sites alike.

There is a tragic part to this form of crime:

- In 2007, a father and son in Radford, Va., were electrocuted while allegedly trying to steal copper pipe from air conditioning units on top of an abandoned manufacturing plant.
- Earlier last summer, a man was killed in West Virginia while allegedly trying to steal copper from utility lines.
- In late July, a man was severely burned and was found dangling from atop a utility pole after allegedly trying to steal copper from the electric company.

#### Big risk for a small return

Such cases are on the rise, said John Shepelwich, a spokesman for Appalachian Power. "Certainly I would think a person would have to be pretty desperate. The risks that these people are taking are so high and the return is probably pretty small."

Copper has been used for thousands of years and is distinctively known for its reddish brown color. Thieves have stolen the valuable metal for decades, often from construction sites, factories, land-line phone companies, and even coal mines. But the theft of cop-

per from electric utilities is more likely to make headlines, partly because it often causes power outages, and because it can result in deadly consequences.

While copper wire thefts aren't anything new, Dana Lohnes, Bell Aliant's director of field operations for Atlantic Canada, said levels have certainly increased since "late summer [2022], heading into the fall."

Copper wire thefts in Nova Scotia are estimated to have resulted in \$1.4 million in losses to businesses, homes and government departments, accord-

ing to police.

But far more can be lost in a copper wire theft—interfering with electrical units housing the metal can be extremely dangerous. A recent theft in Spryfield, N.S. resulted in a brief power outage for more than 11,000 hydro customers, while another local theft had a far more tragic outcome after police discovered a body near a Nova Scotia power substation. The medical examiner con-

cluded the man died of electrocution.

"We're investigating the attempted theft of copper wire," police said on Feb. 7, following the discovery.

In New Brunswick, Codiac Regional RCMP says reports of copper wire theft come in almost weekly. Bell reported 50 thefts in the province between October and December, which prompted the company to hire private security.

In Ontario, provincial police are seeking information after copper wire was cut directly from a Belleville telecommunications line, resulting in nearly \$10,000 worth of damage. In August 2022, Leduc, Alta., police reported that nearly \$500,000 worth of copper wire was stolen from a trucking business in the hamlet of Lac La Biche.

#### Current and former employees suspect

Given the intricacy and danger of dealing with copper wire, some experts suggest thieves have some knowledge of working with metal.

"We find these thieves are generally people who've worked in some type of industry where they understand metal," said Ben Stickle, associate professor in criminal justice at Middle Tennessee State University. He went on to list occupations in roofing and HVAC as examples.

Last year, Statistics Canada reported that metal thefts in 2021 in Canada were at the highest levels recorded since 2013.

Stickle told the CBC that he doesn't expect the problem to disappear anytime soon, especially with a higher focus on electrification on the horizon.

30,000 broiler chick heist



(SOUTH HURON, ON) - Huron County Ontario Provincial Police is investigating the theft of approximately 30,000 chicks from a farm in South Huron.

On Thursday April 20, 2023, Huron OPP officers rece ived a report that the 15-day-old baby chicks were stolen sometime overnight on April 19/20 between approximately 3:30 p.m. and 2:20 a.m.

The chicks are valued at \$1.40 each which calculates to a total of \$42,000 in losses.

These chickens have been bred to grow very big very quickly (especially their breast muscles), and most reach slaughter weight at just six to eight weeks old. If you are a person with knowledge of this industry an anonymous tip could be submitted to Crime Stoppers around July 1st if any unusal transactions occurr involving large quantities of broilers.



### Denali trailer stolen



(TOWN OF ERIN, ON) -Wellington County Ontario Provincial Police are actively investigating a theft occurrence from Third Line, Erin. It was reported that between April 4, 2023, and May 21, 2023, unknown individuals stole a white, 32', Dutchman Denali fifth wheel camper trailer.

# \$9,000 In tools stolen from trailer

# Three fires in close proximity under investigation

No injuries were reported, and initial estimates puts the combined loss at over one million dollars.

On June 7, 2023, at approximately 5:00 p.m., the Wellington County OPP and the Wellington North Fire Department responded to a report of a vehicle on fire in a field off of Sligo Road East. The Wellington County OPP Crime Unit is continuing to investigate bur unsure if all are related.

Investigators are considering the fires suspicious and are continuing to investigate. The Office of the Fire Marshal was notified.

# Stolen trailer used in major lawn mower theft

A search following an arrest, for breach of condition, led to suspected fentanyl and stolen property being found, police say.

Guelph police are looking for the owners of property believed to be stolen following a man's arrest Thursday morning.

Officers patrolling on Speedvale Avenue West spotted a sitting in the driver's seat of a vehicle and knew him to be on a release order with a condition not to occupy any driver's seat. The man was arrested for breaching the order, and a subsequent search revealed a small amount of suspected fentanyl, two stolen licence plates and a quantity of tools believed to be stolen.

A 38-year-old is charged with failing to comply with a release order, two counts of possessing stolen property and possessing a controlled substance. He will appear in a Guelph bail court June 6, 2023.

# Calgary police arrest two in series of online marketplace thefts

Two teens have been arrested in connection to a dozen robberies in Calgary in response to online ads for iPhones for sale.

The thefts occurred between April 23 and May 29 across the city. A buyer using the Facebook profile with the name "Chris Luma" would respond to the ad, show up at the meet and then take off without paying. It is believed multiple suspects were using the same account. Multiple reports of the same getaway vehicle led Calgary Police Service investigators to two suspects.

On June 5th, search warrants were executed and three young persons arrested and property recovered.

Police say to be cautious of selling to online profiles that have recently been created, and have few personal photos or friends. They also encourage people to meet in a public place where there is CCTV coverage like a coffee shop or police district parking lot and to bring someone with you. Saugeen Shores Police station has such a location.

Refrain from going to a stranger's house to deliver items or meeting at your own residence.

Request an e-transfer instead of cash, as this will serve as a deterrent for thieves, and do not factoryreset your phone until the sale has been completed as it can still be tracked with "Find My App."

Stay alert and observe your surroundings. If something feels wrong (like an overly nervous buyer), back away from the sale. Always report suspicious people, behaviour or crimes in progress to law enforcement by calling 9-1-1 or contact Crime Stoppers.

### **Human Trafficking victims rescued**

(Toronto Star)



Peel police say they have rescued 13 human trafficking victims through a multi-jurisdictional human trafficking investigation dubbed 'Project Pacific.'

In a press conference Peel police also announced the arrest of five people as part of the year-long investigation.


Peel police also announced the seizure of over \$48,000 of property and currency.

Det. David Laing, with the Specialized Enforcement Bureau — Vice/Human Trafficking division said the investigation started in April 2022 after Peel police received a community complaint regarding an illegal bawdy house operating out of a condominium in Mississauga.

"Members of this criminal network were using the vulnerabilities of the victims to coerce and manipulate them into working and living within these illegal (bawdy houses)," said Laing.



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Police say all 13 victims are of Chinese descent and have various immigration statuses; 12 of the 13 were recruited domestically.

On March 27, police executed a residential and vehicle search warrant in Mississauga and two residential search warrants in Milton in Markham resulting in the arrest of two women.

Deputy Chief Nick Milinovich, of the Investigative and Emergency Support Services Command added that the GTA is a "major hub for human trafficking."

"Human trafficking is something that can happen anywhere to anyone," he said.

Laing said police believe there are additional victims and witnesses.







## Fraud awareness during Seniors Month

June is Seniors Month in Ontario and the 2023 theme is "Working for Seniors." The Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) would like to raise awareness about frauds that target Ontario seniors, who have spent their entire life saving funds for their golden years. The OPP asks that we work collectively at sharing important fraud prevention tips with seniors in your life.

Being able to recognize frauds targeting seniors will go a long way in helping to combat cyber enabled frauds. With the public's help they want to deliver information, tips and strategies for Ontario's Seniors.

In 2022, the Canadian Anti-Fraud Centre (CAFC) received fraud reports totalling a staggering \$531 million in victim losses. A devastating \$138 million (26%) in losses were reported by senior victims. According to the CAFC, seniors lose on average 33 per cent more than other demographics. It is estimated that only five to ten per cent of victims report scams



and frauds to law enforcement.

According to the CAFC, in 2022, the top frauds affecting seniors were:

- Investment frauds represented \$79.1 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$36.5 million.
- Romance frauds represented \$19.5 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$8.8 million.
- Service scams represented \$8.5 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$6 million.

- Extortion frauds represented \$7.7 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$542,000.
- Emergency-Grandparent scams represented \$7.1 million in reported losses in 2022. Ontario victims reported losing over \$4.3 million.

# Police issue paving scam warning after multiple residents duped

Spring has sprung up across the area, as have paving scams, according to Waterloo regional police. The service has issued a warning to area residents after receiving numerous reports of people being victimized in paving scams.

Police say they have been contacted by seven people this month who were duped by phony contractors, with losses totalling more than \$40,000.

In one case, a group of people approached one victim to say they were doing paving work near Moore Street in Cambridge.

The victim paid them cash to come back the following day to pave their driveway but they never did the work.

In this case, the victim never signed any paperwork with the group, according to police.

Police say residents should research door-to-door companies offering these types of services to confirm their legitimacy before they provide any payment.





#### Suspect arrested in mortgage fraud

A man renting a home impersonated the owner, applied for a mortgage and then took the funds, Toronto police allege, and officers say the suspect may have committed other similar crimes.

Toronto police said in a news release Thursday

that beginning in May 2021, the suspect rented a home using an online rental application. While renting, the suspect allegedly obtained identity information on the homeowner.

The suspect then impersonated the homeowner, applied for a mortgage on the property, and collected the proceeds, police said.

On May 25, Toronto resident Jay Allen MacDougall, 42, was ar-

rested. He's been charged with five counts of fraud over \$5,000 and laundering proceeds of crime.

"Investigators believe he may have committed other similar crimes and are requesting the public to contact them with any information," police said.



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
